

## WEEK IN REVIEW

In 2 Kings 6-7, we see the prophet Elisha display God's **sovereignty** through acts of miracles and deliverance. Miracles serve the purpose of being evidential, empathetic, and evangelistic. They show evidence of God's power, meet physical needs of people, and lead people to the One True God. The acts of miracles in these chapters include making an axe head float, blinding an Aramean army that had planned to capture him, and **prophesying** that a large amount of food would be sold in Samaria the next day. Prophecy is proclaiming God's Word for both the present and the future. God fulfills this prophecy by causing the Aramean army to flee their camp, leaving behind all of their resources and food.

In 2 Kings 8-10, Elisha prophesies that Hazael would become king of Aram and bring much harm and suffering to Israel. In Israel, God chose Jehu as the new king to bring justice against Ahab's family. Jehu defeated King Joram of Israel and King Ahaziah of Judah. He also defeated Jezebel, who is known as the most wicked queen, which was just as God had promised. Jehu also destroyed the temple of Baal and ended **Baal worship**. Baal worship was the worship of false gods and God's people would turn from Him to worship these false gods. However, he continued to allow Israel to worship the golden calves (idols), which showed his obedience to God was incomplete.

In 2 Kings 11, there is a focus on the southern kingdom of Judah, where a woman named Athaliah tries to gain control and authority by removing the royal family. However, God protects a young boy named Joash, who was part of the royal family. Jehosheba, Athaliah's sister, secretly hides Joash in the temple for six years. When the time is right, Joash is crowned king and Athaliah is captured and removed. After Joash was crowned king, the people destroyed the temple of Baal, broke its altar and idols, and got rid of the priest of Baal. Then Joash was placed on the royal throne and the people celebrated. Ultimately, the city remained at peace, worshiping the Lord. Through the entirety of 2 Kings 6-11, God shows that He is in full control, He fulfills His promises, and He always protects His people.
